

over 330 principals, teacher-leaders, and administrators to come together since 2019 safely.





IPLI Extended is a formal, year-long, intensive professional development program for IPLI graduates. Extended allows participants to dig deeper into topics covered during the IPLI experience. INALI



The Indiana new Administrator Leadership Institute (INALI) welcomed its eighth cohort in July 2021 in Indianapolis. This year's cohort includes 98 new deans, assistant principals, and principals.

Modeled after IPLI, INALI is a two-year intensive professional development program for new administrators. Participants attend a two-day summer workshop in July, day-long seminars in September and February, and attend the IASP Assistant Principals Conference or Fall Professionals Conference. Each is provided the opportunity to meet in smaller regional groups led by an experienced mentor.

The Summer 2021 Workshop featured several excellent speakers to help our new leaders in Cohort 8 launch their administrative careers. Ann Puckett-Harpold from the Rooney Foundation shared data information followed by Dr. Rhonda Roos discussing the Deliberate and Courageous Principal. Dr. Todd Bess shared the School Leader Paradigm, Seamus Boyce discussed School Law, and the IASP President Aimee Lunsford ended the day with capacity building. The second day featured Bea Younker on surviving the first years of leadership with discussions on school finance by Jud Wolfe, special education by Jill Lambert, and growth mindset building led by Katy Eastes.

Cohort 7 began Year 2 with Tiffany Barrett sharing information on problems of practice, Dr. Dennisha Murff on equity in the learning organization, Tina Seymour discussing finding our "Why," followed by Steve Baker sharing information on leadership. All in all, both cohorts were energized with topics to support them as they grow in their leadership.

INALI designs its curriculum around the School Leader Paradigm created by the School Leader Collaborative, consisting of a consortium of state principal associations dedicated to supporting and sustaining the professional growth of school principals and their leadership teams. Three of six domains are implemented each year, focusing the first year on the Learning Leader with personal, social, and systems intelligence. The Learning Organization in the focus of the second year with culture, systems, and learning domains.
